

Milling Around Bridge Update

Sweat, determination, support, and of course money were all driving factors in the successful completion of the Motor Mill Bridge. With work beginning on October 11, 2012, it took slightly less than 2 months –until December 6- to complete the construction of the bridge. To celebrate, admire and recognize the work put into the bridge, a ribbon cutting ceremony was held on December 8, 2012. During this opening ceremony, local project partners were on hand along with neighbors and community members. This outpouring of support for the new bridge has continued to grow. Thank you to all Motor Mill enthusiasts in the community and beyond!




Since its completion, the new bridge has attracted a lot of atten tion. One favorite attraction takes place during the holiday season, the bridge becomes decorated with Christmas lights (shown on the left). At least one wedding proposal has taken place on the new bridge. The natural beauty and rustic image of Motor Mill has been used as a backdrop for many prom and senior pictures.

The new bridge also attracted the attention of the Bridgehunter's Chronicles. This is an online column devoted to historic bridges in the USA, Europe and elsewhere. The group held their annual conference in Eastern Iowa in August of 2013 and stopped by the bridge while on a driving tour of other sites in Northeast Iowa.

Completion of the bridge enhanced the quality of the Mill tours and accessibility for visitors but required a large amount of funding. Following the flood of 2008, the Clayton County Conservation Board worked closely with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to obtain federal disaster assistance to help pay for the project. A bronze plaque near the bridge acknowledges that partnership.



TOTAL BRIDGE COST \$1,089,765

Funding for the bridge construction was secured through a FEMA grant along with grants from REAP (Resource Enhancement and Protection), UMGC (Upper Mississippi Gaming Corporation), Iowa Great Places, and the Capital Fund Campaign. An additional inkind contribution was provided by the Clayton County Engineer Department during the process of construction of the bridge.

Minnowa Construction of Harmony, Minnesota, submitted the low bid of \$906,322– more than \$480,000 below the engineers estimate. With contingencies and additional pier work, the final cost was \$1,089,765. With the majority of the cost paid by grants, the Motor Mill Foundation still had to borrow \$85,986 from the Clayton County Conservation Board's Conservation Reserve fund.

Donations since completion of the bridge have reduced the debt amount to \$47,000 but the Foundation still is seeking donations and grant opportunities to finish paying for the project. Contributions are welcomed and they are tax deductible!

Future Plans

Replacing Main Level Floor

The main floor sometimes housed livestock during the Klink ownership of the Mill. The work crew is currently focusing on replacing the flooring that deteriorated due to livestock.

Loft Area

Originally the loft area was used for storage. The loft area floor boards and floor joists were removed many years ago when the Mill was converted for barn uses. During this time, the flooring and floor joists were repurposed to be used in the barn, and in several other buildings near the Motor Mill site. The Foundation has plans to reconstruct the loft area of the Mill by implementing new floor joists and new flooring.

Roof Repairs

In 2009, the Mill roof was replaced with asphalt, following guidelines of the State Historical Society. A wind storm in 2014 blew off several shingles but we are making arrangements to have repairs done. We also plan to replace the roofs on the Cooperage and Icehouse, pending approval by the State Historical Society and availability of funding.

Basement Silt Project

For several years the goal has been to remove the 15 feet of silt that remains in the basement of the Mill but no action has been taken at this point due to issues with various agencies. More information regarding this project will be shared in the near future.




Gap in peak before 2009 joist and roof replacement

Motor Memories Fact, Fiction, and Rumor




This story has been documented in the Motor Mill files but is not listed with a date.

Drunk on Motor Bridge during high water:

Long ago, during high water, a very tipsy man stopped his car on or near the Motor Mill Bridge. He got out of his car and laid with his arm hanging off the side of the bridge. Many of the neighbors were anxiously watching as they debated on what they should do. Too worried about the surge, none of the neighbors went to bring him off the bridge. They watched as the crest came and surged up towards the drunk man. He could just touch the water with his fingertips. This was the highest the 3rd and 4th generation residents of Motor had ever recalled seeing the Turkey.

John Nikolai, President

John and his wife, Mary Fran, moved to Clayton County from the Chicago suburbs in April 1997. Originally from Moline, IL., John had a career in water transportation. He became aware of Northeast Iowa when he managed a barge terminal and scrapyard on French Island in LaCrosse, WI in the 1970's. In 2000 when the Clayton County Supervisors held listening posts throughout the county to get ideas for future growth John spoke out about the historical potential of developing the Motor Mill as a historical tourist destination. He is a founding member of the Motor Mill Advisory Committee established in 2002 and serves as President of the Motor Mill Foundation.

Jon de Neui, Vice President

Jon, a Highway 13 resident, originally resided in Cedar Rapids. He moved to the Clayton County area after completing his degrees in History and Biology. With these degrees, he taught for 5 years and then went on to build houses with his father. Later in life, Jon taught farm construction at Kirkwood for 10 years and then worked for the Amana Colonies where he was the mastermind behind their barn restorations. Jon's construction experience and interest in restoring historic buildings led him to Motor Mill. He partakes in many duties at the Mill and is referred to as the "visionary". Jon has served on the Motor Mill foundation for 11 years.

Chuck Morine, Treasurer

Chuck, an 81 year old go getter, and his wife Syd both serve as tour guides for the Mill. Chuck first became involved with the Mill when he saw the sad condition it was in. He helped with the Mill roof repair several ago and can be found helping with renovations at the Mill each week. Chuck has his Masters in Science from the University of Illinois and taught vocational agricultural for three years. Chuck also served our country in the Army. Chuck returned home to farm for over 40 years. He and his wife moved to Clayton County when Chuck retired in 2001. When he is not volunteering with the Mill, Chuck enjoys flower gardening and is part of the Iowa Master Gardener Program. Chuck has served on the Motor Mill Foundation for 13 years.

Larry Stone, Secretary

Larry stone first saw Motor Mill in 1974, when he and his wife, Margaret, moved to Clayton County. An avid canoeist, Larry regularly paddled on the Turkey River, and a trip that included Motor Mill was always a highlight. More than 40 years later, canoe/kayak floats involving Motor are still a favorite activity for Larry and his family, which includes a son and daughter and four grandkids. Larry worked as an outdoor writer/photographer for the Des Moines Register and as a freelance writer/photographer. He's made thousands of images of Motor, and has written several stories about the site. Moving near Motor increased Larry's interest in the site even more. When he was appointed to the Clayton County Conservation Board about 15 years ago, Larry's interest expanded to how the board could use and improve the site. Larry has served on the Motor Mill Foundation for 13 years.

Lee Lenth, Board Member

Lee Lenth, who currently resides in Littleport, served with the 101st Airborne Arterial Unit for two years. Lee's family farmed for several generations and after completing his service, Lee returned home to work on the family farm. During this time he also married his wife. He and his wife moved to the Communia and Littleport area in 1975 and have lived in Clayton County now for over 75 years. Lee currently works with the Amish where he helps with family construction and taxi services. Through his work on the farm and work with the Amish, Lee has grown to love anything related to carpentry or construction. Lee's knowledge of construction and carpentry are what drew him to Motor Mill and his love for the area has kept him here. Lee has served on the Motor Mill Foundation as a Board Member for 8 years.



Les Klink, Board Member

Les Klink from Communia, IA is personally connected to Motor Mill. Les Klink's grandparents bought the Motor Mill in 1903. Their names were Louis L. Klink and Elizabeth (Wistrick) Klink. During this time the Klink family used the mill for farming. After his grandfather died, he and his father farmed all of the land at Motor Mill as well as the farm he lives on now. He remembers his grandfather sitting on a big rock and talking to people as they came down the river and also remembers being unaware that there was a tunnel in the basement until his teenage years. His fondest memories of the Mill are from his younger years when he helped with farm work at the Mill and threshed oats with his father. Les has served on the Motor Mill Foundation since it first formed in 2002.



Jeanette Muller, Board Member

Jeanette was raised in Clayton County on her family's dairy farm. She graduated from Iowa State University with a Bachelors degree in Fisheries and Wildlife Biology. After college, she spent 15 years doing invasive species control, wildlife, fisheries and plant inventories and restoration projects in parks across the Western portion of the country. In 2004, she returned to Iowa to care for her Mom and shortly after became an AmeriCorps Naturalist where she served as the only Mill tour guide in 2005. During her time at the Mill, she made copies of mill function diagrams to share with other guides, created large packets of world history, and in 2006 trained several other guides. Since spring 2008, she works as a season Biological Science Technician at Effigy Mounds. Jeanette has served on the Motor Mill Foundation Board for 7 years.

How to find us

From Iowa HWY 13: South of Elkader take X3C (Grandview Road) east 3.5 miles; turn left on Hazel Road and immediately take a hard left on Galaxy Road, about 1.5 miles of gravel to Motor Mill.

Or, take gravel road C1X (Grape Road) east from Hwy 13 at Elkader; follow Grape road 4 miles, turn south on Galaxy Road, go 3 miles to Motor Mill.
