

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
FOUNDATION NEWS

The Stable recently underwent a makeover, with a fresh coat of red paint applied to the doors and the roofline by Miller's Woodworking of Elgin, Iowa. During the years when the Mill was open, the roofline was actually flush with the limestone walls. The gambrel roof was added in the 1930s to make room for hay storage. Restoration of the Stable included leveling the floors, securing the support beams and interior structure, replacing the roof, and installing electrical wiring for lights and power.

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HISTORY CORNER: THE COOPER'S TRADE

The word "cooper" most likely comes from the Latin word for vat, "cupa." In New England, coopers arrived with the first English settlers in the 1620's, and their work was important for commerce and daily life (https://www.nharts.dncr.nh.gov).

A cooper was a highly skilled craftsman who used planes, jointers, saws, and knives to shape the wooden staves that made up a barrel. He also made other wooden containers like casks, vats, buckets, tubs, and troughs.

The process of making a barrel started with the wooden staves, or oak slats, which were cut from local timber. After the staves were soaked, they were attached by one end to an iron hoop, creating a cone-shaped ring of staves. They were heated or steamed to make the wood flexible, so additional hoops could be added. Iron hoops were forged in the cooperage.

Wooden barrels were replaced by plastic, cardboard, and stainless steel varieties during the mid-1900's.

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Two coopers worked hard at their trade at Motor: Daniel D. Miller, 31 years old with a family of 2, and William Jones Cooper, 28 years old with his wife, according to the 1870 census of Motor.

HEAVY LIFTING



In 2020, as part of the basement excavation at Motor Mill, two millstone bales—the iron fittings that gripped the stones for lifting—were uncovered in the silt. Thanks to the skill of Cletus Keppler at Royal Products in Elkader, and guided by historic millwright drawings, the recovered bales were restored to their rightful place on the reproduction of a Motor Mill crane. This restoration brought back to life an important piece of mill technology, allowing visitors to once again see how the screw-powered crane made the work of the miller possible.

-Written and edited by MMF members Dan Slagel and Chris Schoen The millstone crane was an essential tool in a grist mill, designed to lift and maneuver the heavy upper millstones safely during cleaning or sharpening. These stones could weigh over a thousand pounds, making manual lifting impossible. The crane used a threaded screw mechanism—a simple machine that transformed rotational force into vertical motion. By turning the screw, millers could slowly and steadily raise or lower the stone, keeping it secure and balanced while moving it off or back onto the power shaft. This ingenious use of the screw allowed millers to handle the massive stones with both precision and safety.
